


Town of Harvard Planning Board 2020 Senior Housing Survey Results January 2021

Basic Survey Facts

- Survey instrument developed by Planning Board Working Group and Staff and Evaluated by Board and COA Reps
- Survey open between November 9 and November 22.
- Total of 130 Responses good mix of Harvard's seniors
- Roughly balanced by gender and across age categories. They live all over Harvard no one neighborhood dominates.
- Most live with a spouse, partner, or at least one family member. Only about 15% live alone
- An overwhelming majority (95%+) own their own home. For the vast majority (95%), that home is a single-family home.
- Given that the survey's target was residents over the age of 50, it is not surprising that most respondents have lived in town for many years. More than 70% have lived here for over 20 years. Another 12% have lived here between 10 and 20 years.


What is your age?



What is your gender?



Are you a Harvard resident?



What part of Harvard do you live in? Please select one geographic area of town that you live in. While there may be more than one choice that seems to apply, pick one that is the best fit in your view.





Question 8 – What They Do Not Like About Harvard






"Taxes, need to downsize, maintenance, and accessibility challenges are the primary reasons cited."



Do you own or rent your current residence?





Do you anticipate moving as you age?









"Overwhelming preference for Harvard Center among specific choices."






Are you interested in considering some type of senior housing in Harvard as you age? 129 responses






Question 16 (116 Responses)

How many bedrooms would you prefer?



What size of unit (amount of space) would you prefer?



Would you prefer to rent or own?



How much are you willing to pay for housing on a monthly basis? (total monthly housing costs including mortgage/rent, utilities, insurance, condo fees)



How important is housing affordability to you?



Would you be interested in additional information about available affordable housing programs?




Question 23 (116 Responses)



Question 27 - Harvard has been designated as an AARP age-friendly community. Please share with us any ideas you have that would make Harvard a more age-friendly community.

Eleven (11) primary areas of response:

- 1. Want sidewalks or paths
- 2. Want better transportation access or availability
- 3. Want housing alternatives to large single-family homes on large lots

Other Responses: Want a larger senior center and more integrated activities, stated taxes and cost of living were a problem, and want shopping and restaurants

Question 28 - How should Harvard balance the need for senior housing with the desire to preserve the town's rural New England character? (For example: Achieve balance by where we put it? By what types of buildings we allow? By how many buildings we allow?)

80 respondents gave substantive answers to this question had much to say on this topic. Several messages come across loudly and clearly:

- 1. A small percentage of respondents suggest we should not or cannot achieve such a balance, and therefore should do nothing while an equally small group apparently take the opposing view.
- 2. The vast majority of respondents (69) provide thoughtful opinions on how to add the housing but not lose the character. They want housing alternatives to large single-family homes on large lots.
- 3. Those 69 suggest there are many ways the balance between senior housing and rural environment can be struck.

Other Key Response Areas: Specifying what the senior housing can/should look like, where we put senior housing, defining the types of buildings we allow, limiting the number of buildings we allow, with many advocating combinations of these areas of focus.

This question elicited a wide range of responses that were classified into seven (7) categories including:

- 1. Specific housing needs
- 2. Challenges to finding housing
- 3. Possible impacts of development
- 4. The need or lack thereof of senior housing
- 5. Projects the Town should look at as models
- 6. General unclassifiable comments, and
- 7. Specific ideas for the provision of senior housing.
